Curriculum focus of school sports grant spending 2024/2025

Purpose: to lead PE across the school (in accordance with the National curriculum) so that children:

- develop competence to excel in a broad range of physical activities through quality PE lessons and opportunities at lunchtime and after school sports clubs.
- are physically active for sustained periods of time through using active learning and DPA; Daily Physical Activities.
- engage in competitive sports and activities through a commitment to the HLC Cluster Events, the Devon Virtual School Games and the associated competitive pathways; and through a range of competitive opportunities within intra-school events.
- lead healthy, active lifestyles.

The impact of Sport Grant spending will be measured through:

Evaluating the quality of PE lessons: by conducting lesson observations and pupil discussions with the PE lead & subject lead Governor.

Assessing the variety of different sports available both within the curriculum and extra-curricular: by regularly scrutinising and adapting the curricular and extra-curricular calendar and timetable in response to identified needs. These conversations take place between the PE lead and AW Coaching, external sports specialist, every half term.

Measure the percentage of children involved in extra-curricular sport and competitive sport: analysis of class lists and registers by the PE lead.

Seeking pupils' views on sport and active lifestyles: pupil discussions with the PE lead once every year.

100% of PE lessons graded as good or better: lesson observations by the PE lead throughout the year.

Honiton Primary School remains committed to the development of school sport, as reflected in the participation, development and success of our children in PE lessons, after school and lunchtime clubs, intra-school hosted competitions and inter-school cluster tournaments and events, and at the local East Devon Finals and Devon School Games Level 2 and 3 pathways. 8. Community Experiences and Events

PE

Children in Need Danceathon

All children had the opportunity to take part in a fun-filled day of physical activity to raise funds for the charity: Children in Need.

Friendship Friday

All children had the opportunity to take part in a sponsored set of challenges: the 'lap of trust', the lap of 'connection' and a turn on the bouncy castle in order to raise funds to improve the S.O.L.E. curriculum and school resources.

Colour Run

Under the vision of the PTFA, all families and their children had the opportunity to take part in a 'colour' run in order to raise much needed funds for school resources and equipment that would enhance all of the children's curriculum learning and creative development.

Devon Cricket Foundation

A 'free' Primary Cricket programme was offered to all children in years 2, 3 and 4. Additional invitation to selected children across years 5 and 6.

All children, Nursery-Y6, completed their Danceathon and Friendship Friday Challenges with 100% participation.

The Colour Run was a sell out - 300 tickets. Enthusiasm, interest and engagement in all activities was very high and hugely positive.

House and vice-captains were fantastic role models, supporting & encouraging the younger children to build their stamina, resilience & skills.

PTFA and parents supported the events generously with their time, refreshments and funds.

All children, in years 2, 3 and 4, completed a 6-week course: with the aim to develop the children's physical cricket skills along with their general life skills of resilience, communication and teamwork. High engagement with positive feedback and pathways into Honiton's local junior cricket teams.

An invited group of children attended a Whizz Kidz skills session to learn how to use the tool that will be their means of mobility for the rest of their lives.

Tae Kwon Do Taster Session

All children from years 1 - 6 had the opportunity to take part in a Tae Kwon Do Taster session run by the local Honiton Club to promote their sport and encourage the children to value courtesy, perseverance and self-control.

One family and their quadriplegic daughter, who is currently in year 1, was offered a place: gaining confidence, skills and affirmation throughout the morning.

Participation by 100% of pupils across years 1 - 6. Hugely positive and beneficial strategies and skills taught to all children and staff.

Proposed aims for 2025 - 2026

- *To continue to participate & compete in the HLC cluster programme - with the East Devon SGO's retirement announced at the end of the 2024-25 academic year, and no set plans across the area for replacement as yet known, the achievement goals of reaching level 2 or 3 pathway entries may not be possible!
- *To provide a greater number of opportunities for outdoor intra-school competitions.
- *To maintain & continue to raise the standards of the teaching of physical education across the school.
- *To raise the standards of physical education in the school, as measured by the school's assessment system.
- *To develop cross-curricular PE within S.O.L.E. projects, where relevant and where possible.
- *To review and update PE resources; particularly those sports to be targeted at lunchtimes and after school clubs.
- *To provide playground and curriculum equipment to ensure all sports specific and activity focused lessons and sessions can be successful.
- *To consider the change in hybrid role of our specialist sports coach, AW, and the impact this will have on internal CPD - there may be a need to 'buy in' support for any ECTs or teachers that may be in new roles.
- *To maintain the Gold School Games Mark Award as a minimum and consider application for the Platinum award now that the Gold Mark has been achieved for 4 consecutive years.
- *To contribute funds towards the updating of playground line markings to support effective use of our outside spaces both in lessons and in play.

Expenditure breakdown for 2025 - 2026 from funds forecast: £19370 ... (£1314.11 current underspend forecast)

- * Learning community sports partnership cost; to organise & support PE events and competitions = £2000
- *AW Coaching providing Lunchtime Intervention Sports Clubs and Targeted After School Sports Clubs = £11153
- *To further update PE resources for Lunchtime PE Intervention clubs and for PE curriculum lessons = £500
- *To contribute to the development of the 'Fun Fit' Programme with training and resources = £100
- *To provide staffing for competitive events; to provide a teacher to lead & organise inter & intra school competition; to lead & manage a strategy for the development of physical education – school management time & the development of whole school physical education provision = £2000 *potentially*
- *Subsidise costs for extra swimming for children not meeting the curriculum requirement = £500
- *Contribution towards the re-marking of two netball courts and additional tchoukball markings = £4230 (*subsidy of £2427.22 from PTFA funds raised from previous sponsored events*) = £1802.78 from PE grant funds
